Established in 1953 by Harris County Commissioner's Court to work on water quality and air quality issues.





Social Distancing






Staggered work locations




Complaints, Inspections and Violations 2019 (Feb-June) vs 2020 (Feb-June)




Most Complaints – 272 in March 2019

Complaint # by Year/ Month




Most Inspections – 356 in Feb 2020

Tiger King is Netflix's most in-demand true-crime series ever with over 34 million viewers.







At Your Service: Learn About Our Complaint Line

Pollution Control Services (PCS) is here to help residents of Harris County. We offer a complaint line to residents who have witnessed forms of pollution such as illegal dumping and burning. The complaint line is one of our primary sources of information for environmental issues as residents are our eyes and ears in their communities.

Complaints made through the line are acknowledged with a field investigation. Most complaints are resolved through the investigator discussing the violation with the subject causing pollution, and the issuance of a Violation Notice which details the law and regulations violated. The focus is assuring that all documented violations of Texas environmental laws and regulations are resolved.

We communicate with residents of Harris County about actions that were taken regarding complaints, so there is always two-way communication. Our goal is for residents to know that all complaints are taken seriously. By receiving complaints, we are then able to identify what environmental issues need to be improved in the community.

What Is A Concrete Batch Plant?

A concrete batch plant uses equipment to combine ingredients into concrete. The list of ingredients commonly include sand, rocks, and fly ash. In Harris County, there are currently 139 operating concrete batch plants. These plants can be a source of pollution if not properly operated or appropriately following standards and laws.

The Hazards of **Concrete Batch Plants** in Your Neighborhood



Particulate matter is a health concern



- Exposure can affect both your lungs and your heart. Numerous scientific studies have linked particle pollution exposure to a variety of problems, including:
- · Premature death in people with heart or lung disease
- Irregular heartbeat,
- Aggravated asthma,
 Decreased lung function.
- Increased respiratory symptoms, such as irritation of the airways, coughing or difficulty breathing.

Meet the Defenders: The PCS Emergency Response Team

Harris County Pollution Control Services Emergency Response Team provides services to citizens by responding to hazardous material incidents that affect Harris County and evaluating their impact on the environment and the public. The team also ensures that any clean up and remediation required by the incident is performed.

Our Emergency Response Team consists of eight staff with the following roles: Emergency Response Manager, Emergency Response Supervisor, Emergency Response Specialists, and Monitoring and Surveillance Specialists. The Emergency Response Team's purpose is to respond to environmental emergencies, collect air quality data in the field and determine violations of law. They are trained to protect residents of Harris County against threats such as hazardous material spills and conduct disaster relief.


There are several different examples of incident notifications the Emergency Response Team receives through our complaint line, but the two primary leading examples are investigating roadway hazmat spills and controlled/non-controlled releases from facilities. These incidents can have an impact on the environment, public health, and enjoyment of property. Direct human contact with pollution can worsen chronic illnesses, which is especially harmful to sensitive populations such as the elderly, pregnant women, and those suffering from respiratory disease.

The Emergency Response Team partners with agencies within Harris County, such as the Commissioners' Precincts, Flood Control District, Homeland Security & Emergency Management, and the Fire Marshal's Office. After an incident is reported to the the Emergency Response Team, specific steps are taken to respond to the emergency. First, the team must gather all the information they can regarding an incident, which allows them to determine what resources, information, and protection are needed for safety. The Emergency Response Team then arrives on the scene, measures the impact of the incident, and weighs the risk of pollution. The Emergency Response Team then relays the primary information to decision-makers.

The Emergency Response Team's main goal is to serve the residents of Harris County. With your help, the Emergency Response Team can continue to keep our environment safe against hazardous materials and pollution. 
